

From the Pastor's Desk


On Tuesday, November 5, Americans will go to the polls to elect the next president of the United States along with other office seekers. Nothing stirs my patriotism more than joining my fellow Americans at the polling booth, casting my vote. This is democracy at its purist. This is the privilege for which our Founding Fathers pledged their "Lives, Fortunes and sacred Honor." This is the right that men and women in uniform have fought to preserve over the past 248 years. Let us honor their sacrifice. It is our sacred duty to cast our ballot. Nothing and no one should hinder us from voting. Most people already know who they will vote for. Some will vote along party lines. Some will vote for the individuals they feel will best serve our nation, states and communities. Some are still undecided.

Last week, Marilyn and I attended a lecture by Jim Wallis at the Mauthe Center on the UW-Green Bay campus. Wallis is a renowned evangelical theologian, writer, teacher and political activist. He has authored numerous books including God's Politics: How the Right Gets It Wrong and the Left Doesn't Get It, and his most recent book, The False White Gospel. Speaking about how we should form our political views and how we should vote, Wallis suggested, "Don't go to the Left. Don't go to the Right. Go deeper." By "deeper" he meant, go to the word of God in the Bible. He cited several passages. For example, Genesis 1:26 where God says, "Let us create humankind in our image." Notice there is no distinction, no differentiation, no separating of races. He also referenced Jesus' parable of the Good Samaritan. To Jesus' Jewish audience, Samaritans were despised outsiders, considered unworthy of their acceptance or of God's favor. To them, there was no such thing as a "good" Samaritan. Yet, in Jesus' story, it was a Samaritan who risked and sacrificed much to come to the aid of a Jewish man left beaten and near death by robbers, unaided by his own people. Wallis also referred to Jesus' parable of the kingdom ...continued

in Matthew 25, where Jesus identified himself with the hungry, the thirsty, the stranger, the unclothed, the sick, the prisoner, and said, "As you have served and met the needs of these, you have done so for me."

Raphael Warnock, U. S. Senator from Georgia and Senior Pastor of Ebenezer Baptist Church in Atlanta, said "A vote is like a prayer for what you want the world to be." I encourage you to vote in this election. I encourage you to vote as people of faith, grounded in the scriptures. We do not use the scriptures to support our particular social or political views as in the case of those promoting Christian nationalism which is a corruption of the Gospel. We go to the scriptures to inform us and direct our values and actions. We do not believe that we have a corner on righteousness. We acknowledge that we, like all humans, are sinners in need of forgiveness and our only hope is God's grace in Jesus, our Redeemer. We acknowledge that our belonging comes first by the grace of God in baptism, not by any distinction society places on us or holds against us. We believe that we bear the image of God as do all other human beings. This should motivate us to seek leaders and legislators who respect the rights, dignity and humanity of every person without exception, who will work to build unity, not division. So, I encourage you to vote. Vote prayerfully. Let your vote be a prayer for the kind of world you want your children and grandchildren to grow up in, a world that reflects the kingdom of God on earth.

Congregation Council Highlights

The Congregational Council met on October 8th COUNCIL UPDATES at 6:30 p.m.

Alexis Rosenfeldt presented the council with her Faith Statement (which can be read on page 15). A motion was made to approve Alexis for Confirmation on October 27.

Pastor's Report: September average attendance was 89. Pulpit supply for remainder of 2024 is: Oct 13th, Rev. Ken Michaels, Nov. 10, Rev. Rick DeBenedetto, and Dec. 8 Rev. Nick Johannes. The Menominee Valley Conference Fall Convention to be held at the Wickman Family Farm October 20th. Zion will host Boundaries Training November 7, 2024, for rostered clergy. Pastor Doug and Pastor Keith will operate the A/V.

September Financial Reports

- General fund decrease of \$9,749
- Large disbursements of \$16,340 for the bell repair; \$4,052 for insurance; \$915.
- Capital Improvement Fund had additions totaling \$1,570 for boiler, \$1,520 for the bell, and \$1,500 for the social hall floor.

Committee Reports

 Property and Safety Committee: Johnstons Heating was called for check up on furnace and thermostats. The flooring project for the social hall now includes the hallway in front of the offices. Pane to Clean was contracted to clean interior and exterior windows for \$935 which was to be done October 17, 2024. Verdin Bell Company will inspect the Bell Tower to make sure the structure is sound; Drees Electric will check electrical components.

Old Business

 AV Equipment: At the time of the meeting, AV was still waiting for the new screen and Pastors wireless mic.

The next council meeting will be November 12th at 6:30 p.m.

Bell Project Update!!



Zion recently received a generous bequest from the estate of Bill Boerner with the request that it be used for the repair of the bell and bell tower. This bequest, added to the existing balance in the Bell Fund made possible by the generosity of others, will enable us to move forward at this time in bringing the bell back to working condition. The Congregation Council approved a contract with the Verdin Bell Company of Cincinnati,

OH, to oversee the project. They did the original installation of the bell and bell tower and have serviced it over the years. The bell was forged in 1888 and has called people to worship for most of Zion's history, both at the former Terrace Ave, location and at the present location.

The bell, the yoke that supports it and the wheel that turns it will be retained. All other parts of the mechanism will be newly forged. The current analog operating system will be replaced with a digital system. This will allow for different kinds of tolling for the beginning of worship, daily noon hour, and other special occasions. The Verdin Company has already made their first visit to remove the parts that need replacement and examine the condition of the tower and its foundation and prepare it for the installation of the new parts once forged.

A final visit will be scheduled upon completion of the parts and pending weather conditions for installation, hopefully in early 2025. The cost of the project will be \$32,680 plus some local electrical work. The Bell Tower Fund currently stands at \$26,500. We are deeply grateful to Carole Boerner and the Boerner family for their gifts that are making the bell restoration project a reality sooner than expected. We are equally grateful to those who have generously contributed to the Bell Fund in recent years. Additional gifts to the Bell Fund will be welcomed. The bell tower is a distinctive feature of the church campus. To have the bell tolling again will be a blessing to our congregation and the surrounding community.

Local Author to Host Discussion

All are welcome to join author Jennifer Flatt for a discussion of the themes of her book, *Ungrieving: A Memoir of Emotional Abuse, Loss, and Relief* at Bethel on Monday, November 25 at 6 p.m. and/or Thursday, December 5 at 6 p.m..


Themes of Jennifer's memoir, published in August 2024 through Mission Point Press, include the complexity of grief, verbal abuse within relationships, religion and mental health, and changing between organized religions. Through paired, small-group, and large-group discussion, participants will explore questions such as:

- How does grief influence our relationship with spirituality and religion?
- How does grieving a person who has been emotionally or verbally abusive change the grieving process?
- How can religion play both a positive and a negative role in mental health?
- How can setting limits and boundaries with loved ones be empowering and healthy?
- Looking back over your childhood and life, what experiences with religion shaped your spirituality?
- What experiences with spirituality shaped how you view organized religion?

Memoirs explore one person's journey and are not meant as self-help books or advice manuals. This conversation will also not provide direct guidance, but instead encourage and guide individual reflection. Participants will benefit more from the discussion if they have read the book in advance. The book is available at The Book Nook in Menominee, via online retailers like Amazon, and directly from Jennifer. Copies will be available for sale at the discussion.

There is no charge for participation and no need to pre-register. Participants need not be a member of any specific religious organization, so please invite others who you feel might benefit from participation.
