ANNUAL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS



Forty-three voting members attended the Annual Congregational Meeting in Zion's Social Hall on January 26th. As a first order of business, the members elected the following persons to leadership positions: Kathy Heimbuch, Sarge Rudell, and Michelle Larson to 3-year terms on the Council; and Adison

Rosenfeldt to a 1-year term as youth member; Julie Williams to a 3-year term on the Personnel Committee; Don Phillips to a 3-year term on the Mission Endowment Committee; Ann Buscher, Michelle Larson, and Carole Boerner for two-year terms on the Nominating Committee. Outgoing Council members Brad Nelson, Jonah Zuehls and Sophie Limberg were thanked and commended for their service.

The members adopted an operating budget of \$246,562 for 2025. This includes \$17,340 (which includes the balance due when the project is complete and estimated costs to Drees for electrical work) for repairing our bell tower. We currently have \$10,444 in Capital Improvement to help cover the cost. This project will reach fruition due, in large part, to generous donations from Zion members. The budget also includes \$9,000 (based on quotes) to upgrade our floor in the Social Hall. We currently have \$5,635 in Capital Improvement to cover this cost.

Various committee and financial reports were presented and accepted. The meeting concluded with the installation of the newly elected Council members. Following the meeting, the Council met to elect officers for 2025. Elected were the following: President-Laura Rowe, Vice-President-Dean Schoen, Secretary-Michelle Larson. LeeAnn Limberg will continue as Treasurer.

Save the Date for 150th Anniversary of Zion

The service is set for Sunday, August 24th and will feature Bishop Finegan as our speaker. We will also have a historical presentation and display and a dinner.

The committee is currently working on choosing a themes, planning the service, things pertaining to the dinner (menu, decorations, etc.), a display in the narthex of historical photos, and a booklet of the history of Zion. We will need volunteers to help with the dinner! If anyone has any items from Sweden, booklets, or other pieces of history we could use for our presentation, that would be helpful! We also humbly ask for donations to help with the cost of the booklet, dinner, mailing, advertising, decorations, etc.

The committee's next meeting will be February 23rd, after the service.

January and February Collection



Zion is Called to Go Where Jesus Leads and our Social Ministry Committee is committed to showing our congregation ways to live out that calling in our community. During January & February we will be collecting items to replenish our school's food pantries.

We're asking for the kind of items that can be sent home with even the youngest kids to prepare for themselves.

Please donate items that can be eaten as is or can be prepared using only water. Microwavable meals are good. Place your donations in the narthex by the collection baskets until the end of February.

Here are some suggestions:

- Meals that are ready to eat such as Chef Boyardee, Dinty Moore, SpaghettiOs, canned fish, chicken, ham, cracker or pretzel snack packs, Pop Tarts, granola bars, breakfast bars, fruit roll ups, beef jerky, trail mix, nuts, dried fruit, fruit and vegetable juices.
- Meals that just need water and a microwave: soups, cereals, oatmeal cups. Many companies make individual serving cups like: A Taste of Thai Noodles, Rice-A-Roni, Idahoan potatoes, Minute Rice.

There is also a need for personal hygiene products like shower gel, deodorant, toothpaste, shampoo, tampons and pads as well as underclothes for students. We can accept donations of new boys and girls underpants, socks and pajamas for students from K-12. Store-bought or homemade mittens & hats are good too.

Social Ministry members are ready to deliver to MHS at the end of January if the collection area gets too full. We'd be thrilled if you brought so many donations that it threatened to take over the narthex!
