Reflections



In May of 2017, I had traveled to San Antonio, TX for a conference. On the return flight I found myself sitting next to a man by the name of Jorge who initiated a conversation with me. During the course of our exchange, the typical questions came out: "What is your name? Where are

you from? What do you do for a living?" etc. As it turns out, he was a professor at a university in Illinois on his way back from a work conference as well. When he learned of my occupation, he became intrigued and started inquiring how I happened to become a pastor, what do I think of the church today, etc. As happens at times when people find out you're a member of the clergy, he shared a part of his faith journey.

Growing up in the Roman Catholic faith, he talked particularly about his grandfather who was a quiet, unassuming man and a very strong role model of a person of faith. He regaled me with memories of his grandfather reading the bible to him, his siblings and his cousins under a tree in the yard whenever they visited. I do wonder, would this have been possible if the work I do was in a different arena?

For me, it's a little easier because the position I occupy more naturally lends itself to open up conversations about God and faith. If, of course, the person doesn't have an aversion to Christianity, pastors or religion in general. But what about you? How do you create opportunities to talk about faith?

Vocation. When most of us hear that term, we tend to think of what we do to financially support ourselves and our families. So, when we're asked, what do we do, that is how we often answer. What if, though, we began instead with the reply of, "I'm a student and servant of Jesus"? Isn't that our vocation?

As Luther reminds us, God calls us to various roles in our lives. Discipleship and apostleship is not just another voca...continued

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tion among many, but one that is meant to be lived out in all of our roles: at work, at home, in the church, and in the wider community—local and global.

As we journey towards Good Friday and Easter morning with the Leader who calls us from death into life, may we let our call as disciples (students) and apostles (sent ones) seep into and out of every vein of our lives.



Cast out your bread upon the waters, for after many days you will get it back.
Divide your means seven ways, or even eight, for you do not know what disaster may happen on earth.

-Ecclesiastes 11:1-2



Far from exhorting us to soggy bread, the teacher encourages us in Ecclesiastes to be so generous with our food and resources that it multiplies beyond the bounds of sense. When we cast our bread upon the waters, we are sharing food with one another without count of cost, and with a mindset of boundless grace. The way the bread returns to us, is by the peace of God, and the mutual love, support and up-building of God's kingdom. Why are we called to share food this way? Because, the teacher says, it will fortify our communities and strengthen them to face whatever disasters may come on earth. Sharing food gives us strength and endurance!

Here at Zion we will be "casting our bread" during the season of Lent to raise money once again for ELCA World Hunger. The money we collect will be presented at the Northern Great Lakes Synod Assembly in May.

Here's all you need to do: Give what you can, as often as you'd like. Use any envelope. Be sure to include your name so we can record the gift on your statement. Drop it in the offering plate any Sunday between March 1st and May 4th.

You'll be able to watch how much we raise by the display in the back of the Sanctuary. Look for the "river" across the windows of the Cry Room. For every \$10 donated to ELCA World Hunger during this time, we'll "cast a loaf of bread" upon that river.



The goal of Zion's Stewardship and Generosity Committee is to help God's people grow in their relationship with Jesus through the use of the time, talents, and finances God has entrusted to them.

As I was walking one day among the beautiful falling snowflakes, I was thinking about this article on the Mark of Study, and I was transported back to a time in 2012 and 2013 when I attended two different sessions of Lay School for Mission, a ministry of the Northern Great Lakes Synod. A variety of pastors in the area participated in leading the sessions, which were excellent. To say these classes were meaningful to me is an understatement. Ini-

tially, I thought I'd be like a fish out of water, probably because I was raised Roman Catholic; however, that wasn't the case at all. The instructors were wonderful, and I learned so much. I felt fulfilled and closer to God, and because I took those classes, I grew as a person of faith, including my understanding of the Bible, and the Lutheran Church. Once again, the NGLS is offering the Faith Formation classes most via Zoom. Check out the website at https://nglsynod.org/lifelong-faith-formation/ for a listing of classes. You might find something that speaks to you.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, March 5th and the Stewardship and Generosity Committee encourages everyone to focus on the Mark of STUDY all year, but especially during Lent. There are many ways to study, but we want to introduce you to a new one from Luther Seminary. It's a Lenten devotion titled "There in God's Garden". The devotion references a Bible reading, short message, and concludes with prayer. This devotion will be sent to your inbox during the week of March 2nd and if you prefer a paper copy of the devotional, they will be available on Sunday, March 2nd.

Another option for STUDY is "The Word in Season," a daily devotional always available in the lobby at Zion. You

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could also choose to read several verses or an entire chapter in the Bible and think about what you've just read and how it affects your life. All of these can be done in the comfort of your home as a solo act of study and worship, but what God encourages us to do is gather and share with one another.

That brought me to think about the "Lutheran Hour" which is held most weeks of the year directly after our Sunday Worship service. This hour-long gathering is all about sharing, listening, and growing! Our discussions center around the Sunday sermon and the readings that week. This session is only an hour long and we cover a multitude of topics, all stimulating and informative. The session allows us to make connections with one another and perhaps broaden each other's perspective. Come and join us for interesting conversation, and a chuckle or two.

Creating Belonging

A story about our ELCA Lutheran Campus Ministry Network, adapted from the LuMin Impact Report

Imagine a place in the ELCA where you can build community, deepen faith, expand minds, and inspire service with over 11,000 young adults. Where does this happen? In our 176 local campus ministry agencies and cooperating congregations, where we transform the lives of college students and campus communities through God's abundant grace. ELCA Campus Ministry is carried out through the collaborative efforts of

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many organizations and individuals: local campus ministry agencies, led by over 200 staff people, synod staff members and campus ministry committees, the Program Director for Campus Ministry and the Young Adult Communities team in the churchwide organization, and the <u>Lutheran campus ministry (LuMin) Network</u>, the association of campus ministry practitioners.



Across our nation, each week during the academic year, over 3,300 students participate in some way in our ELCA campus ministry locations. Over 30% of campus ministries are ecumenical partnerships, while 28% are programs within congregations bringing intergenerational

ministry to life. It's interesting that only 35% of the students grew up in the ELCA. Almost 50% come from another Christian or faith background. In fact, 17% of participants come from a non-religious background, which might account for why 25% of the campus ministries reported at least one student baptism last year!

ELCA Campus Ministries gather students around the core practices of:

- Building Community: Offering places where students experience belonging and safety. Communal meals, fellowship events, and open study space invite students to connect and be nourished.
- Deepening Faith: Worship and prayer are at the heart of ELCA Campus Ministry. From weekly worship to contemplative prayer that foster spiritual resilience and ease anxiety and stress.

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- Expanding Minds: These include faith formation activities, small group conversations, Bible study, as well as studies on theological and social justice issues. Some activities are even offered to the greater university faculty and staff.
- Inspiring Service: Campus ministry raises up leaders for the church and for the world. As young adults take on leadership in the day-to-day life of their campus ministry, they are also inspired to become leaders wherever life takes them: congregations, volunteer service programs, ELCA Seminaries, and their local communities. This peer ministry is powerful for all.

The work of ELCA Campus Ministry and LuMin is driven to inspire, connect, and equip campus ministry organizations to better serve students. This ministry clearly addresses a priority of our church to share the love of Jesus with more people who are new to church, young, and from diverse backgrounds. It is challenging work, with potentially 25% of the members leaving each year as they graduate as well as rebuilding community after COVID, staff transitions especially over the last five years, plus financial constraints and operational challenges.

Campus ministry is vital to our work of church together. Many Campus Ministries receive over 35% of their funding from Mission Support and more than 40% from congregational and individual donations. This support is more and more important to continuing this vital ministry. Pastor Mariah Mills, pastor in Boise, ID, says this about her campus ministry experience, "Because of my own personal experience [in campus ministry], I am deeply passionate about every college campus having a faith community that is a place of safety, welcome, and affirmation for all students."
